On Saturday, February 26, nearly 400 Haggai partners, friends, and leaders gathered to celebrate the transformational work of the Gospel around the world and the exponential growth Haggai has experienced over the last two years. The theme, "Light Prevails," comes from John 1:5, "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it."

Guests heard from Cecilia Sakatira, empowering refugee women in Greece; from Andrew and Josephine Ching, equipping thousands of new leaders across the Philippines; from Supreme Court Justice Vera Ngassa, defending the rights of women and children in Cameroon; and from Dr. Cruz Paniagua, planting churches and seeing souls saved across Latin America.

As you will see in this State of the Ministry report, the darkness may be potent, but the light of Christ is prevailing.

CECILIA

At the Ending Gospel Poverty Gala, guests heard the powerful testimony of Cecilia Sakatira. Cecilia founded Creative Hands in Greece to provide a safe place for refugee women to discover their worth, learn how to weave, and encounter Jesus. Through her work, Cecilia empowers these women to embrace their full identity, all while learning how to support their families financially.

ANDREW + JOSEPHINE

Business owners. Haggai leaders. World changers.

Many titles can be used to describe Andrew and Josephine Ching. Since they attended the Haggai Leader Experience in 2013, the Chings have equipped thousands of leaders across the Philippines through National Seminars.

Knowing the number of Filipinos who go overseas to find work, the Chings dream of fulfilling the Great Commission by training Filipino Christians to spread the Gospel wherever they go.









VERA

"I've been asked many times, who do I think I am? I don't think. I know who I am."

Justice Vera Ngassa has long fought for the rights of the oppressed. Earlier in her career as a trial judge, and now as a Supreme Court Justice in Cameroon, Vera seeks justice for women and children.

"Many people come to court because they have never known the love of Jesus."

Although she stalwartly defends the marginalized, she understands that victims and perpetrators alike are in need of the Gospel.

CRUZ

Dr. Cruz Paniagua has a God-sized dream, and he won't stop until it comes to fruition.

Since his own equipping, this Haggai leader, pastor, church planter, and Ironman triathlete has equipped over 6,000 other leaders and has planted more than 3,000 churches across Latin America.

"From villages to farms, in the city, by plane, by car, by bus, or by foot, everywhere the life of Jesus is needed ... I'll do whatever it takes to end Gospel poverty."



Who Could Say No to One Minute?



Haggai leaders Andrew and Josephine Ching invited Randolf to a Haggai National Seminar in Cebu City in 2016. For Randolf a Filipino native, seasoned church planter, and senior pastor — it was a life-changing experience that sharpened and reshaped his leadership skills.

Randolf returned home, "rejoicing and recharged," with one clear goal in mind: to reach the municipal mayor of Medellin, Cebu, Philippines, the highest position in the municipality. Randolf calls this his "Big, Hairy, Audacious, God-Given Goal." He planned to ask the mayor to spend one minute in prayer with him, thinking, "Who could say no to giving just one minute of their time?"

There was one problem: No one in the mayor's office knew Randolf. Yet, week after week, Randolf patiently visited the mayor's office and asked for a meeting. Finally, at the end of one workday, the office granted Randolf's request. The mayor was curious at Randolf's persistence and touched that Randolf would care that much; he agreed to let Randolf pray with him for one minute a week.

Randolf returned the next week and the next, praying over the mayor for 60 seconds, until one day the mayor asked, "Pastor, why only one minute? I can give you more time to pray with me."







Those minute prayers became unlimited. Then, Randolf was invited to share God's Word during a weekly flag ceremony. Randolf continues to share the Gospel with government staff in this flag ceremony every Monday morning, now with three other pastors.

During the mayor's State of the Municipal Address, he recognized Pastor Randolf as the municipal spiritual adviser. At the same event, the Medellin police chief and fire chief introduced Pastor Randolf to a military officer, who invited him to a newly activated camp. The two became good friends and established Bible studies and values formation instruction at the camp. A few months ago, the military officer was baptized with his son and eight others. This official is now actively ministering to his fellow soldiers and those under his care and has shared the Gospel with his whole family.

Randolf's "huge, audacious goal" continues to impact more and more highranking officials.

He is involved in the center of the municipality's activities and councils, which gives him the influence to speak into how the municipality operates. Recently, he was invited to talk about "Righteous Leadership" at a meeting with newly elected government officials and staff. He also teaches a credited theology course, equipping pastors and church leaders who wouldn't otherwise be able to attend a Bible college.

After their Haggai Leader Experience, Haggai leaders Andrew and Josephine committed to equipping others in sharing the Gospel more effectively. Now, through their equipping of and God's work in Randolf, heads of government and military in the Philippines are coming to Christ, impacting an entire municipality.

"God has enlarged our territory," Randolf says. And it took only one minute.

Imagine living in a country where the name, "Jesus Christ," cannot be spoken. Strict religious laws mean it is dangerous to share your faith, and among your friends, neighbors, and co-workers, you own the only Bible. Yet this Word is so precious that you gather neighbors in Bible studies. You raise vour children in Christianity instead of the majority religion of Islam. Then your children grow up, marry, and do the same. Your arandchildren arow up. marrv. and decide to follow Christ — a feat under such strict circumstances.

But then a terrorist group moves in miles from your grown granddaughter's home. Although they don't yet know she exists, they hate her and your family; but through three generations of faithfulness, God has raised up your granddaughter for a time such as this.

When a terrorist group took over a Middle Eastern country a few years ago, a Haggai leader, M, who is native to the country, faced a decision: Flee or stay.

In this life-or-death situation, she remembered words her father told her after a massacre of Christians he witnessed in his lifetime.

"When it comes to difficult situations clashes, bombs, civil war, poverty," she said, "My father said one thing: 'I will live here and I will die here.' That became a core belief of the whole family."

The terrorist group made their way through M's country, leaving behind a path of destruction and fear. They took over cities and public parks, pitching tents in the streets. Everyone — Muslims and Christians alike — began to flee. It would only be a matter of time before airports shut down and escape would be impossible. M's brother called: "What's your plan? Are you planning to stay or go? We don't want to be victims again."

M and her husband made a decision: "We are responsible for keeping this faith in this area, even if they kill us. It is a privilege to be killed for Christ."

Once she made this decision to stay, facing fear and possibly death, M remembers laughing out loud at the confidence God gave her. "My husband and I had peace in our hearts. I told my husband. 'This is not the first time. We have gone through this before.'"

Indeed, a decade ago, M's city was attacked by another terrorist regime. M's father, knowing the legacy of Christ he and his family carried, decided to stay. Their home became a shelter for more than 400 people fleeing for their lives. Even faced with a bomb threat. M's family clearly heard God say: "Stay where you are." So, they obeyed.

A decade later, M, faced with her own choice decided to walk in faith over fear, following in her earthly father's footsteps with her spiritual Father's guidance. She might be someone's only chance to hear the Gospel.

M had only been a Haggai leader for one year when the terrorist group took over her country. She knew she would need connection with other believers, especially other Haggai leaders in neighboring cities facing similar circumstances. but didn't

know what to do, to whom to talk, what to say, or how to get in touch with them. The roads were closed. Phone lines were inoperable.

But God opened doors and brought 17 nearby Haggai leaders together to meet in secret. They met on the streets, in camps, or in buildings destroyed by the terrorist group. Soon, the leaders began an underground church.

Every Sunday, these followers of Jesus held a service in a gutted building that also acted as a shelter for nearly 40 families.

"We were just trying to light a candle, a small candle among the darkness. It was also a wakeup call for more nominal Christians to seek after God's Word," M said.

Despite its clandestine meetings, the church grew, and the leaders began distributing audio Bibles in multiple dialects. Families would plead, "Please come. Not only to bring aid, but also to give us the Word of God." They began Bible studies, and men and women started making professions of faith in Jesus. But the Haggai leaders knew they could do more, and that God could use them to aid their whole country, if they would only ask Him.

And so, God opened more doors. Over a few months, heads of churches from 12 denominations across the country opened their hearts and buildings, all because of the reputation Haggai leaders held among the Christians in the country.

"They know that Haggai leaders won't pull their people from their churches." M said. "We are there to activate their members to be more active in sharing the Gospel with the people."

These relationships are ongoing, and some of the church leaders across this Middle Eastern country are now board members and facilitators in the country's Haggai National Ministry. Haggai leaders teach the fundamentals of the Christian faith, equip staff of influential ministries, and share the Gospel.

The church carries on and continues to expand, despite ongoing threats and uncertainty. But M and her fellow leaders remain. Their bravery and courage are fueled by the Spirit's guidance, and the tools they bring from Haggai have made them effective witnesses.

"When there is darkness, who are we? We are the light of the world."

If these leaders don't stay and share the Gospel, who will?

"Is not this the fast that I choose: to loose the bonds of wickedness, to undo the straps of the yoke, to let the oppressed go free, and to break every yoke?"

Lady Justice of the Supreme Court of Cameroon and Haggai leader Vera Ngassa uses these words in Isaiah 58:6 to explain her calling. A former prosecutor who prosecuted crimes against women and children which were too long accepted in Cameroon's society, Justice Ngassa now works in the highest judicial body in Cameroon. Her life mission is straightforward,

although often painstaking and dangerous: seek justice, Jesus' way.

"Jesus came preaching the Kingdom of God, and to me, the Kingdom of God is a revelation of systems. To me, it's not about preaching or issuing some philosophy. It is taking the practical realities of the excellence of Heaven and superimposing them upon the systems of the world. We can bring solutions to the problems of the world the Jesus way."

A Tangible Gospel cont'd

From restoring a widow's property stolen by her male relatives to freeing a battered wife from her abusive husband, or from restoring property to a poor man to releasing someone from prison unjustly accused, Justice Ngassa uses the justice system to set people free and provide solutions.

"I have this paradigm of justice because righteousness and justice are the foundation of His throne, and the justice systems are meant to set people free."

Because of the way her mission contrasts with the overbearing patriarchal culture around her, Justice Ngassa has been threatened both verbally and physically. Yet she sees the mission of following Jesus as far greater than any danger she could face.

A chief, angry at a ruling that didn't go in his favor, once tried intimidating her with threats of violence. As he brandished his staff — a sign of dominance — he demanded, "Who do you think you are?"

"I've been asked this many times," Justice Ngassa reflects. "But who did Joseph think he was? Who did Daniel think he was? I'm not the first to be threatened. No servant is greater than his master. Who do I think I am? I don't think. I know who I am."

Confident in her call, Justice Ngassa knows she is poised like no other to right wrongs and seek justice for the oppressed, paving the way for the Kingdom of God.

"I learned early in my career that you bring God's Kingdom wherever you are" These are the words of Eric Seaman, chief technical officer of Millicom, and they exemplify what it means to b a Haggai leader. Leaders like Eric, a businessma who has held several key leadership positions in different companies with influence across Latin America, are uniquely equipped to bring the Gospel and address those needs. As he operates in the business sector of Honduras, in particula Eric has seen — through his Haggai equipping - how the Gospel can move and spread through his calling as a professional.

"I have the strong conviction that professional vocation is part of God's calling under His perfect and eternal purpose for life. In my personal case, what has followed is just the grace of God that has reached me with the opportunities of growth."

For Eric, spreading the Gospel doesn't mean packing up and traveling to a distant location, but rather letting his words and actions impact the businessmen and women he encounters every day. This also means leading by making counter-cultural decisions when business prospects threaten to upend his commitment to following Jesus.
